Go over the consonants in each word using red pencil and go over the vowels in each word using blue pencil.	Three Times Write each spelling word three times. First , write each word in pencil. Second write each word in coloured pencil. Third , write each word in pen.	Adding my Words Each letter has a value. Consonants are worth 10. Vowels are worth 5. Write your spelling words. Then add up the value of each spelling word. Example- said- 10 + 5 + 5 + 10 = 30

Percentage Sale Create a 25% off sale. Work out the new price of an item in a shop if there was a 25% off sale in the shop. Remember: 25% = 1/4. Choose 10 items, challenge yourself to find different sale %, for example 10%, 15%	Talking Numbers Ask an adult or friend to write a number down. Write down as many facts about that number as possible. It could be: digits that total this number; whether the number is odd or even; how many digits it has; numbers which are more or less; where this number is seen in real life, the number in Roman Numerals, links to fractions, decimals, percentage, factors and multiples etc. Then write down a new number and create number facts for the new number.
Shape Challenge Find a 2D shape in your home. Calculate the perimeter and area of the shape. For a challenge, find a 3D shape in your home and calculate its volume.	Data Handling Create a survey (questionnaire) to ask your family. For example, favourite snacks. Present your results in a graph.		Temperature Find the difference in temperature between different cities in the world. Try to include cities with negative temperatures.	
Light Sources Can you find 15 sources of light in your house? Are they natural light or manmade artificial light? Create a list in your homework book.	Quiz Use your knowledge of energy, light and reflection to create a quiz for a family member or friend. You should ask about 10 questions and record in your homework book. Make sure you also create an answer sheet as well.	Craft and design Create a factfile about architect Zaha Hadid. Include a short biography and some facts about her designs.	Volcanoes Research how volcanoes are formed. Write a short paragraph explaining what happens before, during, and after an eruption. Include at least three key facts (e.g. magma, lava, ash cloud). Add a labelled diagram to support your explanation.	Building positive, healthy relationships Write a paragraph about what makes a positive friendship. Include examples such as kindness, listening, and respect. Explain why these qualities are important and describe a time you showed one of them
The Tudors Design a Tudor-style artefact. You could create a royal portrait, a coat of arms, or a menu for a Tudor feast. Include details inspired by the Tudor period and label key features. Add a short explanation of what your artefact shows about Tudor life.	Diary Write a diary entry about one day during the Easter holidays. It could be a day spent chilling at home or a fun day out. Make sure it is chatty, informal and punctuated correctly.	Expanded noun phrases Write five expanded noun phrases (e.g. the enormous, fiery volcano). Then use each one in a sentence. Try to include adjectives, prepositions or extra detail to make your writing more interesting.	Passive and Active Voice Write five sentences in the active voice (The dog chased the ball). Then rewrite each sentence in the passive voice (The ball was chased by the dog). Underline the verb in each sentence.	Shackleton's Journey Create a "survival guide" for Ernest Shackleton's crew. Include at least five items or rules needed to survive in Antarctica (e.g. clothing, teamwork, food). Present it as a poster with drawings and short explanations of why each item is important.
