You can help your children to be positive and optimistic by asking them every day to talk to you about the things that have gone well and the things they have enjoyed. By concentrating on the good things that have happened children feel better about their work, their school and their lives... and they are encouraged to keep trying.

Why not build optimism into your daily routine? After reading with your child, or before turning off their light in the evening, tell them some of the good things that you have enjoyed about the day, and ask them for the best bits of their day. Studies in America have found that doing this doesn't just help the child—it's good for the parent too

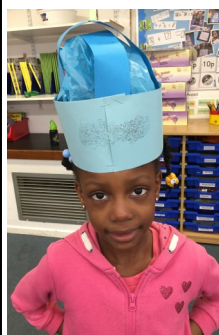

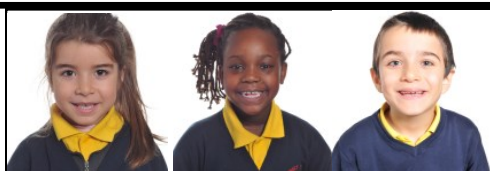
